

George Stevenson

George Stevenson was a pivotal figure in the history of Gorham High School soccer, serving as the varsity coach from 1964 to 1980. During his tenure, he led the team to remarkable success, most notably securing the Maine Class A State Championship and the New England Championship in 1972.

In 1973, he was elected the first president of the Maine Soccer Coaches Association, an organization formed by high school and college coaches to promote the sport. He was also listed as President again in 1974.
- Teacher and mentor: In addition to coaching, Stevenson was a high school math teacher, influencing students both on and off the field.
- His record at Gorham over the 16 years was 189 - 49 - 17. From 1985 - 1988 he coached the South Portland boys winning 46 more games. His win total reached 235 placing in on the +200 Wins Archive on the Maine Soccer Coaches website
